**Noteworthy Incidents**

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- Sgt. Scott Borton, Ofc. Scott Barb, Ofc. Michael Gabel, Communication Specialist Angela Potter, and Communication Specialist Lisa Baker answered a call regarding an armed intruder at a Granger Road residence. Their collective actions resulted in the apprehension of the offender and the rescue of the victim.

Chief McNeely offered a commendation to those members of the department.

Mrs. Corbett stated the Trustees had received communications from several employees involved with this incident praising Chief McNeely's actions in bringing the situation to a peaceful and safe end. She requested a commendation be placed in Chief McNeely's file.

**Recommendations**

Chief McNeely recommended, and **Mrs. Corbett moved, to hire Teri L. Burnette as a part-time Communication Specialist at the entry level rate of \$15.87 per hour, effective March 16, 2011, under all rules and regulations in the Bath Township Personnel Policy Manual with a one-year probationary period. Mrs. Goodrich seconded the motion; the motion passed.**

Chief McNeely recommended, and **Mrs. Corbett moved, to purchase three Dodge Charger Police Package vehicles from Brunswick Auto Mall to replace the three 2008 Dodge Chargers currently in service, at the price of \$23,465 per vehicle. Mrs. Goodrich seconded the motion; the motion passed.**

**Fire Chief James Paulett**

**Report:**

During the month of February the department responded to ninety emergencies with 60 Station One calls, 20 Station Two calls, and 10 dual station responses.

During February the department assisted Copley in extinguishing a large out building, assisted Hinckley after a house explosion claimed two lives, and auto-responded to Fairlawn Fire for a residential structure fire.

During the previous two weeks of flooding the department responded to Wooster as part of the county special response teams, and mutual aided Copley Monday night evacuating people from ten homes due to flooding. Bath units were called around 9:30 p.m. and the last crews completed around 3:00 am.

During the Copley mutual aid more than 20 of Bath personnel participated either on the scene or station stand-by.

Chief Paulett displayed recognition plaques from the Red Cross given to the department for their work in the following emergency responses.

**Red Cross Recognition as written in the program March 1, 2011**

Lieutenant George Seifert and Fire-medic John Rodriguez of the Bath Township Fire Department peered over the cliff to assess the situation. They were responding to a frantic call from a family which had been hiking along the cliff in a remote corner of Camp Christopher when a ledge gave way. A young girl had fallen fifteen feet down the cliff side, a boulder pinning her left leg. With the girl hanging precariously above a 35-foot drop, the two officers knew this would be no ordinary rescue. Lt. Seifert radioed

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the station requesting repelling equipment, emergency supplies and a portable hydraulic ram. Within minutes, a second team led by Captain Walt Hower arrived with the requested equipment. Both Captain Hower and Lt. Seifert repelled down to the girl. Using a series of ropes, hitches, and pulleys, the pair secured the girl as well as the boulder. While hanging 35-feet in the air, the two firemen positioned the ram tool between the cliff face and the boulder. They managed to move the boulder barely two inches, but it was enough to free the girl's leg. Lifted free of the cliff face, the girl was transferred to an ATV and transported to a nearby field and a waiting MedEvac helicopter.

Some six months later the Bath Township Fire Department was once again summoned to Camp Christopher. Two boys had slipped away from a group of high school students and began climbing a steep one-hundred foot incline. Nearly at the top, one of the boys lost his grip. As he fell, he grabbed his friend's leg pulling him down the sheer drop as well. The boys fell 50 feet before striking a rocky slope and tumbling still further. The initial responders, immediately began treatment of the two injured youths. The rescue efforts were hampered by the ruggedness of the terrain, the remoteness of the site, and the injuries the boys had sustained; one of them suffered severe head trauma as a result of the fall. Unable to get a vehicle to the location, much of the equipment had to be carried in. Through teamwork and a careful evaluation of the situation, the rescue team was eventually able to immobilize the boys, transport them down the remainder of the slope and hike them a quarter of a mile to a waiting ambulance and MedEvac helicopter.

Miscellaneous

In December of 2010 Bath Township sent out a Request for Proposal to update the Township Zoning Resolution. The Township received RFP's from a total of four different consulting firms. Those consulting firms included Compass Point Planning, McKenna Associates, MS Consultants, and Poggemeyer Design Group. Selected members of the Bath Township Zoning Commission and Appearance Review Commission along with the Township Trustees, Township Administrator, Township Legal Counsel and the Zoning Inspector/Administrator interviewed the four potential consultants to update the Bath Township Zoning Resolution. Following the interviews there were discussions with some of the firms regarding overall cost of the proposals and the Township requested that the applicants review the proposals as well as the proposed budget. After reviewing the changes with due consideration the selection committee decided to recommend Wendy Moeller of Compass Point Planning for the project. Ms. Moeller is familiar with the Township as she was an integral part in the Comprehensive Plan Update.

**Township Administrator William Snow**

**Report:**

Mr. Snow reported LandMark Disposal had been purchased by Rumpke Waste and Recycling Services, and residents should be aware that service will continue, as usual, although the trucks picking up trash will now reflect the Rumpke name.

**Recommendations:**

Mr. Snow recommended, and **Mrs. Corbett moved, to appoint Assistant Fire Chief Tim Gemind as Interim Fire Chief, effective March 16, 2011. Mrs. Goodrich seconded the motion; the motion passed.**

**BUSINESS FROM THE BOARD**

**Trustees Elaina Goodrich and Becky Corbett**

Mrs. Corbett gave a response to Citizens for Bath Seniors' (CBS) request that inheritance tax monies received by the township be used to fund a senior center and related activities.

Mrs. Corbett stated the Trustees serve all residents of Bath Township and must make decisions based upon the welfare of the citizens as a whole. They are aware of the needs of many citizens' groups such as youth, young mothers, seniors, and others. Decisions the Board of Trustees make have to be based on the welfare of the entire township. The township does not fund any specific groups or programs with regard to room rentals, refreshments, copying and mailing costs, or supplies.

Mrs. Corbett assured the audience the Trustees are not neglecting or ignoring senior citizens, as she has been gathering information for activity opportunities since September 2010, when first approached by the group. She cited she has also been working with Copley Township, Copley Health Center, and Chambrel to coordinate a regional approach to assist seniors.

Mrs. Corbett has brought forth a Senior Fair concept, which will be held on April 14, 2011 at Copley Community Center from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and the Citizens for Bath Seniors have been invited to attend. The committee will share information gathered from surveys being distributed at the event. Planning this event has opened the door of opportunity to combine resources with both townships, Copley Health Center, Chambrel, and possibly, Fairlawn.

With the passage of Senate Bill 5, local government is facing budgetary challenges, including the reduction of local government funds, inheritance tax, and a possible reduction in property value reappraisals.

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Mrs. Corbett stated the township currently offers the We Care program, Knox Box, free blood pressure checks, and check and replacement of smoke detector batteries. The township offices also have on hand a list of county programs and other agencies to assist seniors.

Community organizations needing volunteers include the Bath Museum, the Grange, and Bath Volunteers for Service.

Mrs. Corbett reported she is approaching area churches to determine if they have available meeting space on a continual basis.

Inheritance tax money is used for capital improvement projects in the township and while the request by CBS to use these monies to fund a senior center is not outrageous, it is the tip of the iceberg, as operating expenses would continue for years, as well as program funding. The state is currently working toward eliminating inheritance tax revenues. Ultimately, the taxpayers of Bath would need to pass a levy to support the costs of operating, maintaining, and staffing a senior center, and the taxpayers need to determine whether their tax dollars should be used for this program. It is not that the Trustees aren't aware or don't care about the needs of certain Bath Township demographics.

Mrs. Goodrich presented a history of community initiatives in Bath Township from 1960 to the present.

Conclusion: Forty-one acres purchased for Bath Community Activity Center

- 1960 Mrs. Richard Slusser and Mrs. William Falor, representing Bath Volunteers for Service, requested a Community Center for the township.
- 1967 Signatures of 281 people who supported the establishment of a free public park were presented to the trustees.
- 1967-Park levy of .5 mill defeated.
- 1969 Bath Community Activity Center land was purchased (38.1739 acres and later purchased an additional 3 acres) on Lot 35 with inheritance tax.

Sponsor: Bath Volunteers for Service

Conclusion: Multi-purpose facility feasibility study for Bath and Richfield

- 1988 Bath Volunteers for Service initiated and funded an investigation into funding the construction of a community pool.
- A phone survey of 400 residents in Bath and Richfield indicated support.
- 1989 BVS allocated \$4500 to hire a consultant for phase I.
- The committee interviewed six architects to do a feasibility study.
- 1990 Leisure Group (Braun and Steidl Architects) completed a feasibility study and master plan for a multi-purpose facility.
- The EPA would not allow a new commercial sized package plant in Bath. They said a center must use the sewage plant in conjunction with the Revere Local School District or be in the sewerred southern section of the township.

Conclusion: Richfield Village issue failed at ballot. Richfield Township indicated it was not interested.

- Bath Township Minutes October 18, 1993-A professional study by Leisure Group indicated that Richfield and Bath could form a Joint Recreation District in which operations of a recreational facility could be supported by user fees but the infrastructure (land, building and equipment) would require citizen and government financing. A valid petition was submitted by 400 Bath electors requesting trustee support. A resolution was passed for a joint district to be formed by Richfield Village, Richfield Township and Bath within six months subject to unanimous agreement.
- 1993 Ballot issue for a joint recreation district with Richfield Village and Bath Township was on the Richfield Village ballot. Issue failed: For-555 Against-670.
- Richfield Township indicated it was not interested in a joint district.

Conclusion: Bath Natatorium and Fitness Center issue failed at the ballot

- Bath Township Minutes June 6, 1994-Elaina Goodrich and Pat Witmer asked for a ballot issue to be placed before the voters for November, 1994 to create a Bath Township Recreation and Park District.
- Bath Township Minutes July 18, 1994-Bath Natatorium and Fitness Center Committee recommended a \$4,500,000 Bond issue at 1.34 mills for 20 years or 1.6 mills for 16 years for the November 8 election. Trustees agreed to consider proposal.
- Bath Township Minutes August 1, 1994-Trustees requested a meeting with Elaina Goodrich and Don Huelick (Leisure Group) to review proposed financing. The committee had been working on this project for five years. Several organizations had pledged support.
- Bath Township Minutes August 15, 1994-Trustees moved a special meeting to consider a ballot issue for Bath.
- Bath Township Minutes August 22, 1994 A Bath Township Resolution was passed to place ballot issue before the voters on November 8 for a 1.44 mill 20 year levy for the Bath Natatorium and Fitness Center.
- Bath Township Minutes October 24, 1994 signs for Issue #44 appeared in the township.
- Bath Township Minutes November 7, 1994-Trustees thanked Mrs. Goodrich, chairperson, of the Bath Natatorium and Fitness Center Committee.
- Bath Township Minutes November 8, 1994-Bath Township voted on a levy for a Bath Natatorium and Fitness Center, which failed. For-1416, Against-3531.

Conclusion: Overall results tended to be moderate toward construction of such a facility. Results were somewhat more favorable for a Copley Township-Fairlawn

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center and separately for a Richfield Village-Richfield Township center. Bath Township was least interested in a center. The issue was dropped by Bath Township.

- 2000 Bath, Copley, and Fairlawn investigated the possibilities of a joint recreation center. Mrs. Goodrich, Trustee, was the liaison for this project
- 2001 Fairlawn received \$65,000 from the State of Ohio (HB640) Urban Areas Community Improvements for a survey and feasibility study.
- 2001 Jesse Marquette from the University of Akron's: The Center for Policy Studies, Institute of Health and Social Policy; was hired to conduct a joint community recreational and fitness center survey.
- 2002 In January the University of Akron conducted a survey of five communities. 17,000 surveys were sent and 5,446 were returned for a 42% response rate. Bath's response rate was 49.1% (1,635 surveys). Overall results tended to be moderate toward construction of such a facility. Results were somewhat more favorable for Copley Township-Fairlawn center and separately for Richfield Village-Richfield Township center. Bath Township was least interested in a center. 37.6% of Bath respondents indicated they would support bond financing for construction of a facility while 57% indicated they would not support bond financing for construction of a facility. Also 45.8% of Bath respondents favored using the operating budget for construction while 46.6% did not support using the operating budget for construction. Bath Township strongly supported (77.5%) membership fees for funding operations.
- Bath Township did not pursue further investigation with Fairlawn or Copley.




